Lent Modules

Module Lent 1 The Upside-down Kingdom of God

PURPOSE

To explore Jesus' radical, challenging and upside-down teaching about the Kingdom of God and relate it to contemporary issues in society and how, as Christians, we respond to them.

COURSE CONTENT

During the sessions we will consider issues such as climate change and equality and develop our understanding of Jesus' teaching about how we are to live distinctively, applying that to the cultural challenges of our own times.

The 5 sessions are:

- Who is my neighbour?
- The generosity of God
- Poverty & justice
- Salt & light
- Here on earth as it is in heaven

Module Lent 2 Lost Christianities

PURPOSE

We will consider the diversity of beliefs in the early Church, and how the Church we know today emerged from competing interpretations of the life and death of Jesus. The course will end by considering what this teaches us about the nature of our faith and how we live with diversity in today's Church.

COURSE CONTENT

Week 1 – Introduction and Jewish Christianity
Week 2 – In search of knowledge: Gnostic Christianity
Week 3 – A Church for the pure: Novatian and Donatus
Week 4 – Creator or Creature: defining Christ
Week 5 – Diversity today: what can we learn from the past

TARGET GROUP

This module is suitable for anyone interested in the variety of beliefs in the early Church and what they can teach us today

Please note this module will be entirely online, using the online MOODLE platform. It allows the flexibility to participate at any time during the week. Once you have registered, your confirmation letter will provide details of how you can access the site. This is NOT the same as using ZOOM.

Module Lent 3
Science and Faith - is there a place for scientists in the Church

PURPOSE

This module considers the issues where scientific thought might be seen to 'clash' with the Christian faith.

COURSE CONTENT

Why should a scientist, or indeed any rational person, come to church? After all, Christians have a strange set of beliefs. Can anyone believe in a virgin birth and a God who is three and yet one, not to mention a world created in 6 days and populated. Is there still a place for thinking about God in a world where the scientific enterprise and scientists are held in high esteem? This short course is an opportunity to consider the critical interaction between the life of the Christian faith and the work of those who explore the world through the scientific disciplines, and suitable both for those who have thought about and/or studied this area before and those coming to these questions for the first time.

Module Lent 4
"The Book of Job – Why does God let innocent people suffer?"

PURPOSE

To become familiar with the Book of Job and understand the debate about why innocent people suffer. To relate this to various kinds of suffering in our world today and discover how we can respond well to those who suffer in 2021.

COURSE CONTENT

1. Job has a Problem (Chapters 1-3)
2. Job has a Complaint (Chapters 4-14)
3. The Friends have an Answer (Chapters 15-31)
4. Elihu has Youthful Wisdom (Chapters 32-37)
5. God has the Last Word (Chapters 38-42)

Module Lent 5 Pilgrimage and Saints

PURPOSE

To experience and learn about the spiritual discipline of pilgrimage. To look at the different nature of churches, including their associated patron saints.

VENUES

Pilgrimage around the 7 churches in the Heddingham and Upper Colnes (Stambourne, Toppesfield, Tilbury-Juxta-Clare, Great and Little Yeldham, Castle and Sible Heddingham.)

COURSE CONTENT

An overview of Pilgrimage, tradition and contemporary. Our own faith journey(s).

A short lecture on each church's Saint (St Peter, St Thomas Becket, St Nicholas, St Margaret, St Andrews, St John the Baptist, St Margaret of Antioch).

The 'spirit' of the churches and how they vary using the 7 churches of the book of Revelation as a basis, how to generate a holy and loving spirit in our own churches.

Day 1 will include a 8-9 mile walk, and day 2 about 6 miles. Sturdy boots and suitable clothing needed as the terrain is a mixture of track (probably muddy) and quiet roads.

Please bring own lunch and drinks as we can't provide hospitality due to covid19. Masks will need to be worn inside the churches.

Module Lent 6
Living as a Christian in the scientific and technological world of today and tomorrow

PURPOSE

This course will draw upon experiences of the participants, course leader and others to explore what it means to live as a Christian in the scientific and technological world of today and tomorrow.

COURSE CONTENT

Within three weekly evening sessions participants will engage with the relationship between science and faith, with what it might mean to become 'better' from both a scientific and a theological perspective, and how the voice of Christians working in the fields of science, medicine and technology can illuminate our thinking as we face the future.

The three session titles will be:

1. Experiences of Science and Faith in Partnership
2. What does it mean to be a better person?
3. Listening to different Voices on Technology

Anyone interested in exploring what it might mean to live as a Christian in the scientific and technological world of today and tomorrow. No previous scientific or theological experience required. All are welcome.

Module Lent 7
Jesus and the Entrepreneurial Kingdom
Enabling Innovative strategies for Kingdom mission

PURPOSE/AIM

This module explores the disruptive mission of Jesus to establish the Kingdom of God and its parallels with the dynamic innovative leadership of the entrepreneur. We link the eight parables of Matthew 13 with the leadership strategies of Ephesians 4 to challenge the way we think, try some new tools and stimulate a 'New Normal' of creative vision for mission and ministry.

COURSE CONTENT

Studies draw on Kingdom parables, especially Matthew 13, the Prophets and Ephesians 4

Session 1: Inspiration. God, the entrepreneurial Spirit, the treasure and the pearl

Session 2: Vision with imprecision. Unfolding Kingdom, risk, freedom and fear

Session 3: Mind the Gap! Entanglement and Pivoting – vision, values & message

Session 4: Entrepreneurial Evangelist. Multiplication and disruptive mission

Session 5: Dust to disciples. Replicate! Equipping for unbounded empowerment

TARGET GROUP

Anyone with a heart to see the Kingdom of God grow in their work, community, church and mission. A willingness to explore and challenge norms would be helpful. It is anticipated that this will be especially helpful for those in any leadership role in church or the wider world. Even if you do not think you are entrepreneurial, the course aims to help you enable and mentor others with such gifts.

Module Lent 8
The history, beliefs and practices of Jehovah's Witnesses

PURPOSE

The Watchtower Society has recently moved their headquarters from Mill Hill in North London to the Chelmsford area. The higher visibility that this gives the organisation of Jehovah's Witnesses in this area presents many questions which the course will seek to explore.

COURSE CONTENT

Jehovah's Witnesses are well known for their door to door visits, their apocalyptic message and their refusal of blood transfusions.

What is less well-known is their connection, in the early years of the 20th century, to what is now the Diocese of Chelmsford. This connection is now being renewed with the construction of their new British headquarters just south of Chelmsford on an 85 acre site able to accommodate up to 1,200 residents.

The four sessions of this course will look at these recent developments and explore the history, beliefs and practices of this group. It will also consider portrayals of Jehovah's Witnesses in popular culture. It will enable you to understand your Jehovah's Witness neighbours and consider how best to respond to their visits.

1. Jehovah's Witnesses in Essex and in popular culture.
2. The history of Jehovah's Witnesses.
3. Jehovah's Witnesses' distinctive beliefs.
4. Life as a Jehovah's Witness.

Module Lent 9
Seeing Jesus: Art and Meditation to prepare us for Easter week

PURPOSE

To share our enthusiasm for these works of art and to enable God to speak to us as we contemplate Jesus' journey to the Cross. Each of the three tutors has a different style for delivering this.

COURSE CONTENT

Session 1: The artistic and theological significance of the painting 'The Trinity' by Masaccio

Session 2: Meditation based on the art of Sieger Koder : Jesus washing the disciples' feet.

Session 3: Meditation based on the sculpture 'The Garden of Gethsemane' by Veit Wagner displayed in Strasbourg cathedral

Session 4: The story behind the painting of 'The Scapegoat' by William Holman Hunt

Session 5: Meditation on 'Jesus fell on the way to the Cross' inspired by the painting of Sieger Koder and the poetry of Malcolm Guite.

Module Lent 11
Surprised by Prayer

PURPOSE

How do we recognise we are praying? And what barriers to prayer might we self impose?

COURSE CONTENT

I pinched the overall and first title from CS Lewis and, nothing loathe, I pinched three more from Jane Austen: 'Prayer Prejudice and Pride', 'Prayer and Persuasion' and 'Prayer Sensibility and Sense'.

Taken together these four are not about how to pray, still less about what to pray. All of us must pray as we can, not as we can't, as someone once said. Really this course is about our state of mind when we pray – our attitude to God and our expectations of prayer. It is often difficult to accept the truth about prayer, which is God gives us what we need, not necessarily what we think we want.
