How has the lockdown impacted on your walk with God?
What areas of your life has God been refining?
What habits have you begun that you want to continue?
2 The lockdown and our church Come to me all you who are weary and I will give you rest. My yoke is easy and my burden is light.' Matt 11: 28-30
What have you missed most about church?
Are there things you have felt relieved to stop doing, things you won't miss?

What difference has it made to you that worship and prayer are now offered online?
3 Exiting lockdown and beyond. 'Forget the former things. Do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs u. Do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland. Isa 43: 18-19
What activities have we as a church stopped during the crisis, that were already unfit for purpose, or had lost their way, and that we should let go off completely?
Are there things we have started during lockdown we should continue?
Are there new things God is calling us to start now?
What may be the enduring pastoral needs caused by lockdown – economic, emotional, spiritual, medical – that we will need to respond to?
Before lockdown our usual pattern of Sunday worship was four Sunday morning services: an 8am, two at 9.30am and one at 11am. This is now unsustainable and cannot continue. Setting aside any personal preferences you may have; how might we best serve the worshipping and missional needs of our communities?
